

Take/Retake the ACT or SAT

Although taking the ACT/SAT costs money, it may save you more by helping you earn academic scholarships. Some private scholarships will ask for your scores as well.




Meet with your high school counselor

Meet with your high school counselor as soon as possible to ask about ACT/SAT, scholarships, FAFSA, and college deadlines! Write down any questions you have before and during your appointment.

File the FAFSA!!!

(Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

The FAFSA is the #1 place to get financial aid for college. Even if you feel like you wouldn't be eligible, still apply, it's free! *Many scholarships and some colleges require it to be completed. The FAFSA provides: Grants: free money for eligible students. Loans: borrowed money for all students. Work-Study: funding for a campusaffiliated part-time job for eligible students.



Keep your GPA up all year

Your GPA plays a big role in scholarships and some college applications. Many colleges in Utah offer academic scholarships that take your GPA and ACT/SAT scores to determine an award amount. You can earn this scholarship just by applying to the college!



However, there are many resources to assist you in paying for college. Search for private scholarships and reach out to colleges' Dream Centers.

November

Look up college deadlines & apply!

In Utah, some colleges have priority deadlines starting at the beginning of November. Look up the deadlines for the colleges you are interested in and apply ASAP. Then, if you're going to live on-campus, apply for housing.


Apply for scholarships

There are many different types of scholarships.

The best way to find them is:

- Search scholarship websites,
- Talk to your counselor about local scholarships,
- Apply to college department scholarships







Accept your financial aid awards

In the spring, or sooner, you may receive your financial aid award. The award will consist of scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study (if you filed the FAFSA and applied to scholarships). Ask the college or your high school counselor how to accept those. *Some students may need to provide extra paperwork to the college verifying their FAFSA information before the college can give an award. Follow their instructions.

What's next?

- Choose your school
- Deferment, if applicable. This is for those taking gap years for religious service, military, work, etc.
- New student orientation
- Meet the academic advisor at your college
- Register for classes

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- Check in with your counselor and/or college access adviser about your plan for college and career readiness.
- Ask for letters of recommendation. Some colleges (and scholarships) require one or more letters of recommendation. Connect with teachers and counselors early in the fall of your senior year.
- Stay on track to complete a certificate program at your local technical college either before high school graduation or the summer after. Remember these programs are tuition free to high school students.

Apply to college in the fall.

- Apply to colleges during the fall of your senior year. Participate in Utah College Application Week at your school. Ask your counselor for more information.
- Apply to more than one college so you can compare the colleges' financial aid offers as well as their class size, location, programs, and more. For help comparing colleges, see the Facts at a Glance at **ktsutah.org**.
- Check with the colleges you're applying to and see what ACT scores you should be aiming for. Some colleges are test optional. If you want to improve your score, study, study, study, and retake the ACT the fall of your senior year. Check college admissions deadlines to make sure your new ACT scores will be ready in time
- If you haven't already, create a Keys to Success login at **ktsutah.org** to explore your two year, four year and technical college options.

Fill out your FAFSA.

- Complete your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as early as October at **studentaid.gov**.
 - ** Even if you don't think you will qualify for federal grants, you should still fill out the FAFSA. The State of Utah and many colleges require it for scholarships and other aid. **
- Get help completing your FAFSA by attending a FAFSA Completion Open House during the school year. Check with your counselor to find an event at your school or nearby.
- If you are a student with undocumented citizenship status, see what scholarship options might be available for you at **educate-utah.org** and review the qualifications for in-state tuition through the HB 144 affidavit on pg. 36.



Continue applying for scholarships.

- Research what scholarships are offered by the colleges you've applied to and check deadlines.
- Learn about scholarships offered by the State of Utah on **ktsutah.org**.
- Apply for as many scholarships as you can during your senior year. Use the resources at **ktsutah.org** to help you find scholarships.

Check on campus resources and services.

- If you have an IEP/504 or a disability that will need accommodation, start making arrangements now by contacting colleges' disabilities resource centers.
- ☐ Visit with college student success centers to learn about scholarships, tutoring, events, and more.

Narrow it down.

- Visit the websites or call any colleges you've been accepted to and ask about their first-year experience programs and summer bridge programs.
- Send in your final high school transcripts to your college once you graduate.
- Be sure to accept any financial aid you might have received. Talk with your college's financial aid office to make sure you're good to go.

Be proud. Celebrate!

Participate in your school's College Decision Day activities to celebrate your accomplishments. Ask your counselor for more information.

Take math during your senior year.

Be sure to take the right math for your future career. Use the guide on pg. 9 to help you figure out which math class is right for you.

Deciding what to do after high school can be challenging. As counselors we often find students asking important questions such as: What post-secondary options are available? What services are available to help me make these decisions?

The ASVAB Career Exploration Program can help students and parents make these decisions. The ASVAB Program (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) is one of the most widely used and highly regarded career development programs in the world. The ASVAB Program helps students to:

- Identify, understand, and organize information about their interests, skills and work-related values
- Identify suitable occupations to investigate and pursue based on their own interests, values, skills and competencies
- Use career information resources to explore these occupations

This program is provided Free of charge to schools and students and is available to any Sophomore, Junior or Senior at Hillcrest High School. The ASVAB Career Exploration Program is a cooperative venture between the nation's schools and the Department of Defense. Students taking advantage of the program may be contacted by military recruiters if in their junior or senior year. Information from the test can be utilized by Hillcrest counselors to help students identify courses that align with their interests and career goals.

The ASVAB Test will be offered on October 2, 2024, at 8 am in the Career Center. Students who are interested will need to pick up a permission form from the counseling center and return the signed form prior to the test. We hope that you will consider taking the ASVAB and discovering valuable information about your skills and interests!

Getting Started

1. School counseling or guidance office

- School counseling or guidance offices are a great resource for students with scholarship questions.
- Set up a meeting and prepare questions.
- Apply to as many scholarships as possible.

2. Apply through the college or university for

- Scholarships upon admission:
 - Many Utah colleges offer automatic scholarship opportunities when students apply.
 - Some colleges require separate scholarship applications.
- Departmental scholarships
- Leadership scholarships
- Private scholarships

3. Explore employer-sponsored tuition

- : Tuition reduction
 - Employee benefits that provide reduced tuition.
 Tuition reimbursement
 - Employee benefits that reimburse employees for tuition costs.
- Employee scholarships
- Both parent and student employers may offer these benefits.

4. Community scholarships

- Many community organizations and local businesses provide scholarship opportunities.
- o Inquire at your credit union.
- Check with local businesses.
- Ask community organizations.
- Local scholarships can increase the chances of earning an award.
- Applying for scholarships with \$250-\$1,000 awards can add up and reduce out-of-pocket-costs.

5. Search for scholarships online

 An online search for scholarships can go a long way. Be cautious of scams and fraudulent applications. Never pay to apply for a scholarship. If a website seems suspicious, leave it, and visit an official site instead.

File the FAFSA

- Although the FAFSA doesn't directly provide scholarships, completing it may be required to qualify for some scholarships.
- Many scholarships that require the FAFSA are based on financial need, but there are exceptions:
 - O For example, the Opportunity Scholarship is meritbased and requires the FAFSA to be completed.
